Early Porcelain

 During the <u>Han</u> Dynasty (206 BC–220 AD), <u>Jingdezhen</u> was known as Xinping. Historical records show that it was during this time porcelain began to be produced here.

The First Teapots


 Before teapots were invented, tea was traditionally <u>made in</u> <u>cauldrons, or large pots,</u> <u>and served in bowls</u>

Meissen Teapots & Porcelain

 In 1708 that Ehrenfried Walther von Tschirnhaus devised a way of making porcelain in <u>Dresden</u> <u>Germany</u> and started the Meissen factory in 1710

 <u>Kaolin</u> is the primary material from which porcelain is made **Other ingredients:**

 <u>feldspar, ball clay,</u> <u>glass, bone ash,</u>

steatite, quartz,

petuntse and

<u>alabaster.</u>

Ingredients

 Some teapots have a piece inside to keep the tea leaves separate in the water. This part is called a strainer or an infuser.

Ingredients


 Teapots should have a small hole in the lid. The purpose is that it allows the tea to pour without splashing.

PARTS OF A TEAPOT

 Natural tannin sediment in an unglazed teapot should be left untouched as over time it will enhance the flavoring.



PARTS OF A TEAPOT

• The best way to wash out an the inside of a Yixing teapot that is unglazed on the inside is to wash with warm water, no soap and air dry.
